6. PRESENTATION – COMMUTER AND MOTORIST ASSISTANCE AND VANCLUB PROGRAM

Brian Cunanan, Program Manager and Hanan Sawalha, Senior Management Analyst presented a detailed overview of the RCTC commuter and motorist assistance and Vanclub programs.

Mr. Cunanan and Ms. Sawalha discussed the website traffic, how to call 511, the RCTC callbox program, the commuter assistance program and its' incentives, and travel training.

Jennifer Nguyen, RTA, added the RTA is working with LA Metro to connect to the Olympics, World Cup, and other transit destinations. RTA also does travel training when called or when visiting their website.

7. PRESENTATION – WESTERN RIVERSIDE COUNTY REGIONAL CONSERVATION AUTHORITY

Aaron Gabbe, Regional Conservation Director, presented an overview of the functions of the Western Riverside County Regional Conservation Authority. He discussed the concerns surrounding the public accessing the lands, species success, various ways of acquiring the lands, maintenance of protected areas, and connecting habitats for safe crossings/passages.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

This item is for the Committee to:

BACKGROUND INFORMATION:

The 2009 Measure A Expenditure Plan allocates approximately 11.6 percent of the annual revenues from the 2009 Measure A Western County program to public transit. The public transit allocation is then distributed among five programs, namely: specialized transit services, specialized transit-consolidated transportation service agency operations, commuter rail, intercity bus, and commuter services. The Measure A Specialized Transit Program receives about 1.9 percent of the 2009 Measure A Western County program revenues, or a 16.4 percent share of the 11.6 percent for public transit. The program provides funding to benefit older adults, persons with disabilities, and/or those that are most vulnerable and truly needy in Western County. In Western County, this funding has been distributed through a competitive process to a wide array of non-profit and community organizations that serve these constituencies for specialized transit services for persons with disabilities and older adults.

The goals of the Measure A Specialized Transit Program for western Riverside County are to:

- Support directly operated services that expand or extend existing services, which, if not funded by Measure A funds, would leave an area and/or special population without alternate service options;
- Support existing services that offer an improved level of service coordination with the existing transportation network;
- Expand new services that leverage other revenue sources, can be administered in a costeffective manner, and will not require long-term support from Measure A funding; and
- Support new and expansion of existing services including transportation for veterans and shuttles including, but not limited to, nutrition and medical services.

Projects that are eligible under the program include operating and capital projects such as senior transportation shuttles, non-emergency medical transportation services, bus pass/voucher programs, mileage reimbursement programs, travel training, vehicle and maintenance equipment, communications and dispatch equipment, and mobility management.

Providing funding to non-profit providers of transit services for persons with disabilities, low income, and senior citizens has long been a priority of the Commission. The voter-approved 1989 and 2009 Measure A Expenditure Plans specify funding allocations for the provision of this type of service provided by transit operators and non-profit agencies.

A Call for Projects is held triennially, and the current Call for Projects was held in spring 2024 for funding for Fiscal Years (FY) 2024/25 – 2026/27. The Commission has awarded about \$10.9 million to 17 agencies for 22 operational and capital projects, as summarized in Attachment 1.

The specialized transit services are promoted countywide with social service agencies and at public offices such as senior centers, libraries, community centers, cities, colleges, and public bus operators. For this cycle, RCTC plans to distribute approximately 12,000 brochures. This includes 6,000 in English and 6,000 in Spanish.

DISCUSSION:

The CSTAC plays an important role in strengthening the public and specialized transit network by offering a platform for specialized transit providers to share information and promote various transportation services. Staff invited Measure A recipients to provide presentations to the CSTAC to highlight their programs and projects and receive any input on how their services can be improved and expanded in the future.

Presentations from the Angel View, Inc. and Blindness Support Services will be given (Attachments 2 and 3). Angel View is new to the Measure A Specialized Transit Program but has been providing services for over 70 years in the Coachella Valley. Awarded in the amount of \$229,967 of operating funds, Angel View anticipates providing 11,834 one-way trips over this cycle. Blindness Support Services has returned to the Measure A Specialized Transit Program due to the program being suspended during Covid. Blindness Support Services is expected to provide 2,000 one-way trips and was awarded \$208,949 in operating funds.

Need for Measure A Program



- Children with disabilities need to be monitored regularly by physicians

- Transportation a huge cost burden to low-income families
- Families often choose between paying rent, buying food or gas
- Angel View reimburses up to 1,250 miles per child at \$0.40/mile for medical travel
- Payments administered by Independent Living Partnership



Zachary



Mrs. O, a single mother, came to Angel View seeking services for Zachary, 8 months old, who has multiple disabilities/delays including Fetal Alcohol Syndrome. Due to frequent medical appointments out of the area, she needed assistance.

Through Angel View Outreach, the family was granted mileage reimbursement to cover the expense of medical travel. Mrs. O was also provided with resources for support groups including Outreach's IRC parent support group.



Kehlany

Kehlany was born with Down syndrome, cerebral palsy, and other disabilities that resulted from her mother, Jazmin's, pregnancy complications.

Angel View was able to assist with mileage reimbursement, resources, medical supplies and family counseling that helped Kehlany's four siblings better understand the situation. While working with the family, we learned one of Jazmin's other daughters has autism, so she is now an Outreach client as well.

The family is better stabilized and Kehlany's big personality is blossoming.





Matthew

Mrs. M requested help from Angel View for her 9-year-old grandson Matthew. Matthew has autism and a speech language impairment. Initially, his speech therapist referred the family for mileage reimbursement to cover their daily trips, but he also needed a communication device to help aid him at home and during his therapy sessions.

Angel View Outreach was able to provide reimbursement for Matthew's medical travel and a communication device to help him learn and practice different means of communication, aside from traditional language.
